NAIDOC week is where all Australians celebrate Aboriginal culture and the achievements of Aboriginal people.

The theme for this year's NAIDOC Week is: <u>Always Was, Always Will Be</u>

This recognises that Aboriginal people have occupied and cared for this country for over 65,000 years.

Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people were Australia's first explorers, first navigators, first engineers, first farmers, first botanists, first scientists, first diplomats, first astronomers and first artists.


This is the 2020 NAIDOC Poster, called Shape of Land

"Shape of Land" tells the story of how the Rainbow Serpent came out of the Dreamtime to create this land.

On the poster, there is a snake and it forms the shape of Australia, which shows how it created our lands.



The rainbow colours on the Rainbow Serpent, and the Australia shape, shows a connection to country. The overlapping colours on the outside represents the Dreamtime.

The figure inside the shape of Australia is a representation of Indigenous Australians showing that this country, since the dawn of time . . . Always Was, Always Will Be - Aboriginal Land.

We share this land beneath our feet that we meet upon today, with the traditional owners, the Guringai people, past present and future.

We pay our respects to the ancestors and shall always acknowledge their connection to the land










Here is a completed version of the collaborative colouring. WOW!! They will look so awesome when every class has one done and hanging in the room.








Reading Group Activities

We all heard some Dreamtime stories this week. We had to discuss the story and work out the message in the story. We had to sequence the story and put it back into the correct order. We had a comprehension activity based on the story. We also retold the story in our own words and created illustrations to support our story.
