LOCAL WEATHER REPORT

In Bureau of Meteorology terms, south east Qld has just lived through a "severe weather event", in fact we are still dealing with the aftermath; and the weather system which caused it is now creating havoc in northern NSW.

Constant heavy rain caused widespread flooding, and for a time Peachester was completely isolated. All roads leading in and out of the township were cut — Bald Knob Road, Commisssioner's Flat Road, Beerwah-Kilcoy Road impassable to the west at the Stanley River Bridge (photo thanks to Debbie Mangan), and to the east at the Beerwah School intersection (Ch 7 photo).

You may notice in Debbie's photo a rescue is taking place after a truck was swept off the road on the western side of the bridge - a learning experience for us all, as even a truck was no match for the strength of that fast-flowing water.

There have been huge rainfall totals, with numerous locations measuring 1000mm or more during the event, and many places recording over 300mm in a single day.

At times like this we think of famous local weatherman Inigo Jones, whose weather research and long-range forecasts made him a household name throughout Australia during the 1930s to 1950s.

Did you know that in February 1893 at the time of major floods in Brisbane and SE Qld, Inigo recorded 35.71 inches (907mm) in 24 hours at Crohamhurst? This is still an Australian record. Considered in the context of the extensive flooding and damage to homes, businesses, roads and farms we have just experienced, imagine if there had been 907mm in any 24 hour period during the last week!






FAREWELL TO BARRY FORSYTH


It is with a heavy heart that Mum, Stew and I announce the passing of Barry Forsyth.

Below is the intriguing Manx coat of arms, map showing its location, and photographs of the striking landscape and the Island's famous TT motorcycle event.










A MOMENT IN TIME

FREDERIC WILLIAM HODGENS Peachester Head Teacher, 1921-1932

NOTE: We will be featuring local schools this year, leading up to the combined schools' reunion in October, initiated by Woodford Historical Society. We are helping by gathering photos and stories from Crohamhurst, Commissioner's Flat and Peachester Schools. Thanks to Joy Hodgens for this story about her father-in-law who spent many years teaching at both Peachester and Beerwah Schools. Fred Hodgens was fourteen years old when he became his father's pupil teacher. Thomas Hodgens was Head Teacher of the Tewantin School. After five years of training Fred was classified and took up his first school at Blyth's Creek near Roma. From there he became an Itinerant teacher in Western Queensland. He enlisted for the First World War in 1915 from Charleville. After the War Fred taught in London for a short while before returning to Queensland. His first appointment was to Taringa State School until his doctor advised him to move to the country. Fred had been mustard gassed during the war, the effects lasting him a lifetime. Fred bought a Peachester block adjacent to his brother Syd, and was transferred to Peachester School in January 1921.

Fred Hodgens lived on the farm and rode his horse or drove in the sulky to school each day. In wet weather he stayed with Bill and Kate Shuttlewood in a big Queensland style house near the school on Commissioner's Flat Road. He often had lunch with the Shuttlewoods and this is when his pupils got up to mischief. They soon learned that when Mr. Hodgens said not to climb trees he meant it. They found out too that he frequently carried a cane up his sleeve in the playground. One such pupil, Brent Otto, remembered Mr. Hodgens as firm but fair.

Mr. Hodgens dressed meticulously for school in the bush in the 1920s. He always wore a coat, waistcoat and tie, starched detachable collar, saddle twist trousers, braces, hat and well-polished riding boots. One Inspector was known to criticize his drill technique, which offended Fred no end, for being a Lieutenant in the War, he'd had many years of drill practice.

Maria Hodgens, Fred's mother, who had teaching experience, frequently came down with him and taught the little ones under the school. It would have been primitive and uncomfortable on the red dirt floor. In those days teachers had to average 45 pupils to qualify for an assistant teacher. In the time he taught at Peachester, Fred had two assistants, Delia Foley for two years and Mary Tracey for twelve months.

In 1931 Fred Hodgens married Grace Simpson, a Beerwah girl, who was teaching at Norwood at the time. He took long service leave for six months and worked on the farm. Fred was then transferred to the Downs but asked for a local transfer as Grace was expecting their first child. He was duly transferred to Beerwah as Head Teacher where he taught until his retirement in 1955.





FORESTRY HISTORY

AS THINGS WERE John Huth

This 221-page book covers early tree plantings and some forestry themes from the Queensland scene.

The first part is on historical tree plantings: Queensland Acclimatisation Society, Arbor Day, State School forestry plots, Save the Tree Campaign and Main Roads plantings and a chapter on big trees.

In the second part I have presented some historical accounts on the Yarraman and Maryborough forestry districts and information on forestry camps.



The activities of Forestry during World War Two (overseas and at home) and after the war (displaced people) are detailed.

As a tribute to those who served and died in war there is a chapter on memorials to the fallen and an incomplete list of men from Forestry who served in World Wars One and Two.

The etymology of some logging areas, details of forestry places on the Queensland Heritage Register and the use of crown hammers are also included.

This book is not written along a time line per se. Rather, the snippets are plucked from John's extensive collection. The coverage of topics is broad and contextual. The reader is exposed to tree plantings from school plots to memorial graves to commercial scale plantations. The tough breed of men and women who made it happen, and the basic living conditions of the early days are highlighted by an impressive array of images. Indeed, an appreciation of the growth and spatial coverage of forestry and associated operational components are enhanced by the use throughout of an edectic treasury of photos and prints garnered from a myriad of sources.
