Did you know that Clapham Primary is a part of the Eco-Schools framework?

What is Eco-Schools?

Eco-Schools is a global schools-based sustainability education framework. This year, Clapham Primary has five Eco School Leaders to lead our community as an Eco-School. What do Eco School Leaders do?
