DISCIPLESHIP

How many of you felt a little uneasy as you listened to today's Gospel? I would hope that most of us were a little uneasy as we heard Jesus' challenging words to anyone who chooses to follow him as a disciple.

From the very beginning, Jesus tells us that he is not offering us an easy way of life. He is asking us to be like him - focused on doing the will of the Father no matter the cost. We know that this focus took him away from his family, cost him the lack of material comforts, and eventually brought him to the cross. If we choose to follow him and focus our lives on doing the Father's will, then we too may have to make choices in our relationships.

We may have to renounce some material comforts, and certainly we will have to carry our own crosses in this life. Jesus is telling us that we must sit down and calculate our willingness to make these choices and our courage to follow them through.

It's very easy to listen only to the challenge in Jesus' words, and forget that he spoke them out of love for us and for his Father. He has told us often that he will never ask us to do anything on our own. He will always be with us and provide the grace we will need to meet the challenges. Any challenge will be only a bump on our road to eternal union with God.

That is why we heard Solomon's prayer for wisdom in today's first reading. His prayer must become ours. The Holy Spirit gifts us with wisdom that will enable us to see the events of life from God's perspective. Wisdom enables us to trust that everything that happens to us is in some way part of God's plan for our salvation. He will give us whatever we need to be faithful.

We pray this morning and every morning for the wisdom and the courage we need to answer Jesus' challenging call to discipleship. May we learn to depend on grace for the strength we need to live out our response.

THE STORY OF THE NATIVITY OF THE VIRGIN MARY

Birthday celebrations bring happiness to the celebrant as well as to family and friends. Next to the birth of Jesus, Mary's birth offers the greatest possible happiness to the world.

The Church has celebrated Mary's birth since at least the sixth century. A September birth was chosen because the Eastern Church begins its Church year with September. The September 8 date helped determine the date for the feast of the Immaculate Conception on December 8.

Scripture does not give an account of Mary's birth. However, the apocryphal *Protoevangelium of James* fills in the gap. This work has no historical value, but it does reflect the development of Christian piety. According to this account, Anna and Joachim are infertile but pray for a child. They receive the promise of a child who will advance God's plan of salvation for the world. Such a story, like many biblical counterparts, stresses the special presence of God in Mary's life from the beginning.

Saint Augustine connects Mary's birth with Jesus' saving work. He tells the earth to rejoice and shine forth in the light of her birth. "She is the flower of the field from whom bloomed the precious lily of the valley. Through her birth the nature inherited from our first parents is changed." The opening prayer at Mass speaks of the birth of Mary's Son as the dawn of our salvation, and asks for an increase of peace.

At the human, biological level Mary is our precious link to the incarnate Son of God, Jesus Christ, whose birth some 2000 years ago we recall at Christmas. Mary leads us uniquely and constantly to Christ's incarnation, his taking on of flesh and blood. We look with Mary at Jesus and with Jesus at Mary, so as to understand the union of God with humanity and, by grace, to begin to share in what it means, to begin to become saints.

Each time we celebrate Mary's birth, we can confidently hope for an increase of peace in our hearts and in the world at large.



<u>VOLUNTARY EUTHANASIA IS NOT OUR WAY,</u> SAY ELDERS

remote Indigenous communities are bitterly opposed to next month, praying for protection of this country and its voluntary euthanasia and its introduction would undermine trust in the health system.

The concern is the sleeper issue in Western Australia and Queensland in the intensifying debate over the expansion of assisted dying law from Victoria to states

with big Aboriginal and islander populations.

Rose Elu, an elder in Brisbane's Torres Strait Islander community and an Anglican, said she recognised the compassionate argument for easing the suffering of dying people, but the taking of human life would offend the deep sense of spirituality and Christian faith permeating remote Indigenous communities, whatever under the spiritual guidance of Sydney Auxiliary Bishop the circumstances.

Australian Conference of Catholic Bishops president Archbishop Mark Coleridge and Anglican Archbishop of Brisbane Phillip Aspinall say that euthanasia legislation before the West Australian parliament and moves to introduce a law in Queensland send "mixed messages" when Indigenous suicide rates are soaring. Victoria's right-to-die law came into effect only eight weeks ago. The Anglican bishop of North Queensland, Keith Joseph, said voluntary euthanasia could rebound on Doctors and faith leaders have sounded the alarm on the healthcare providers.

<u>A SYNOD IS NOT A PARLIAMENT: POPE</u>

Before a synod, bishops must learn what their people want and think and need, not so they can change Church teaching, but so they can preach the Gospel more effectively, Pope Francis said this week. Source: CNS.

The Pope discussed synodality with 47 bishops of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, Australia, the United States and Canada.

Archbishop Sviatoslav Shevchuk, head of the Ukrainian Catholic Church, told Francis that "every bishop made his journey to Rome carrying with him the sufferings and hopes of the people of God entrusted to our pastoral

The bishops, he said, want to be synodal – walking together with their people – "not only during our sessions but also when we return to our communities. Because, in fact, one cannot walk while seated!"

Speaking to the bishops, Francis focused on Archbishop Shevchuk's remarks and on how the Eastern like the Orthodox churches, have a longer and uninterrupted history of decisions flowing from bishops' synods.

"There is a danger," the Pope said, which is "thinking The message of this year's National Child Protection Week, today that making a synodal journey or having an attitude of 'synodality' means investigating opinions – what does this one and that one think – and then having a meeting to make an agreement. No! The synod is not a parliament!"

While synod members must discuss matters and offer their opinions, he said, the purpose is not "to come to an agreement like in politics: 'I'll give you this, you give me that." Bishops must know what their lay faithful, priests and religious think, Francis said, but it's not a survey or a vote on what should change.

"If the Holy Spirit is not present, there is no synod," he said. "If the Holy Spirit is not present, there is no Church. Synods are not for deal-making, but for listening to Spirit."

<u>AUSTRALIA TO JOIN GLOBAL ROSARY</u> **INITIATIVE**

Church leaders and community elders have warned that Australians are invited to take part in a global Rosary people, priests and religious, sanctity of life and marriage. The consecration of Australia to the Immaculate Heart Of Mary and for the nation to live out its calling as the Great South Land of the Holy Spirit are also included in the prayer intentions.

> With the focus being the Eucharist and Rosary, coordinators are being asked to work with their parishes and priest for this event to organise eucharistic

processions, Adoration, and Rosary recitation.

The worldwide Global Rosary on October 13 will pray for world peace and reparation for the world, as well as each country's specific intentions. Australia's participation is Emeritus David Cremin.

The Global Rosary movement began in 2017, when Poland's bishops gathered to re-consecrate their country to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. This initiative resulted in more than two million faithful accompanying their priests and bishops to the borders of the country to pray the Rosary for its protection.

DOCTORS, CHURCH LEADERS WARN OF 'DEATH CREEP'

"creeping" expansion of voluntary euthanasia, warning that safeguards in the Victorian law have been stripped

out of proposed legislation in other states.

"There is serious concern about this slippage," the chair of the Australian Medical Association's ethics and medicollegal committee, Chris Moye, told The Weekend Australian, voicing concerns about the West Australian legislation, while further changes are being proposed in Queensland. Dr Moye warned that protections in the Victorian law had been cut from the WA bill, which also allows doctors to raise a discussion of euthanasia.

'A lot of this (change) was happening even before the Victorian law, which is only two months old, has actually been tested," Dr Moye said. "At this point, we haven't seen how assisted dying works in Victoria and yet the slippage is happening across these various jurisdictions.

In Victoria, euthanasia eligibility is restricted to dying adults assessed as having fewer than six months to 12 months to live. Doctors are not allowed to raise the option of assisted death with eligible patients. The proposed WA llaw reverses this, allowing doctors to instigate a euthanasia discussion.

Camilla Rowland, of Canberra-Goulburn family support service, said more parents were seeking support because of increased family separation. Other factors were mental health issues, disability and financial pressures.

"Family functioning improves when parents are supported with education and when they are supported with therapeutic interventions, particularly those families who are vulnerable," Ms Rowland said.

Daryl Higgins, director of the Australian Catholic University's Institute of Child Protection, said that "What is often missing in our suite of services is broad support for all families. Rather than wait until a crisis occurs, service providers should support families to "get out in front of issues and address them before they become a crisis."

INTRODUCTION TO MASS:

The wisdom tradition from which the first reading is taken is rooted in the fact that life is a series of choices. It is hard enough to 'guess what is in our grasps' let alone 'the things of heaven.' God's gift in the form of Wisdom is our friendly companion that God sends to us for guidance.
