

THE SUN OF RIGHTEOUSNESS

Have you ever prayed for a parking spot? Which reminds me of the Irishman who went around the block twice looking for a spot, and in his frustration lifted his eyes towards Heaven and prayed 'Almighty God, if you find me a spot I'll go to Mass every Sunday and give up the Guinness.' Just then, a parking spot opened up and he dashed in to the space, raised his eyes to heaven and said 'Almighty God, disregard the previous conversation, I just found a spot by myself.

Our prayers can tell us a lot about the image of God we really have. For some it is of a Divine Parking Attendant in the sky. For others a sort of weather God who with sufficient entreaty can stop the rain during the second day of the Test Match.

But if you were in Syria and your town was being strafed and bombed by government and rebel forces, with innocent people being wantonly killed, then your prayer would be very different.

Your image of God would be of a Liberator from warfare, of a Saviour from crimes against humanity, and if it came to it, a Strengthener in time of torture and impending death.

In today's Gospel, Jesus was preparing his followers for what he knew would be times of persecution in the immediate and ongoing futures for the Christian community.

Imagine hearing these readings in a Catholic church in Syria, as the congregation fearfully gathers in the wake of murderous violence by some Muslim extremists against Christians, or in a church in a village in China with the Catholic community trying to keep its ties with the Pope, fearful of denunciation and betrayal by family and friends, as predicted by Jesus in today's gospel.

There would be a yearning and heartfelt hope which would be a real prayer by those Syrian and Chinese disciples. They would be looking for vindication of their perseverance in persecution. They would cling to Our Lord's assurance: 'Your endurance will win you your lives.' They would listen to the prophet Malachi:

'The day is coming now... evildoers will be like stubble... But for you who fear my name, the sun of righteousness will shine out with healing in its rays.'

What a wonderful image of God, putting our rather pathetic parking spot attendant and weather God images to shame. 'The sun of righteousness will shine out with healing in its rays.'

This is the image for God which would mean something very heartening in the midst of the seemingly endless darkness of persecution. God will do what the sun does, flooding the world with light and warmth, making our fragile planet habitable for human beings.

It is our faith that out of the inky blackness of the cold tomb carved out of a hill near Calvary, the Son of righteousness did rise, shining out with healing in His rays. That is what the early church believed during those early centuries of persecution. They believed that Son when he had said: Your endurance will win you your lives.' This belief is what sustains the martyrs of our present era.

The word 'martyr' is the Greek word for witness. It simply means somebody who witnesses to something.

A Christian martyr witnesses to Our Lord Jesus Christ, the pre-eminent martyr. Their blood is shed, as was His. They do so with the faith that for them, the Son of righteousness will shine out with healing.

That is our faith, that is the faith of the church. What was in the future tense for Malachi, is a present reality for those in parts of Nigeria, of Indonesia, of China, of Syria and elsewhere. This is what sustains them. There will be vindication. Justice will be done.

Because the Son of Righteousness rose with healing in His rays.

POPE FRANCIS MESSAGE OF HOPE FOR WORLD DAY OF THE POOR

In observance of World Day of the Poor this Sunday, the Church in Australia is recognising volunteers who work to bring hope to those in need.

The third World Day of the Poor focused on the theme "the hope of the poor shall not perish for ever". Taken from the Book of Psalms, Pope Francis said those words "express a profound truth that faith impresses above all on the hearts of the poor, restoring lost hope in the face of injustice, sufferings and the uncertainties of life".

"The psalm was composed at a time of great economic development that, as often happens, also led to serious social imbalances," the Holy Father wrote.

"The inequitable distribution of wealth created a significant number of poor people, whose condition appeared all the more dramatic in comparison with

the wealth attained by a privileged few."
Today, too, Pope Francis says, "we must acknowledge many new forms of bondage that enslave millions of men, women, young people and children".

"Daily we encounter families forced to leave their homeland to seek a living elsewhere; orphans who have lost their parents or were violently torn from them by brutal means of exploitation; young people seeking professional fulfilment but prevented from employment by short-sighted economic policies; victims of different kinds of violence, ranging from prostitution to the narcotics trade, and profoundly demeaned," he lamented.

"How can we overlook, too, the millions of immigrants who fall victim to any number of concealed interests, often exploited for political advantage, and are refused solidarity and equality? And all the homeless and ostracised persons who roam the streets of our cities?" Bishop Vincent Long van Nguyen OFM Conv, chair of the Bishops Commission for Social Justice, paid tribute to the many thousands who volunteer in Catholic organisations across Australia to assist those "They work in our jails, in charitable organisations with those who have fallen on hard times, and they help the most vulnerable members of our community," he said.

"For this third World Day of the Poor, we say thank you to each and every one of our volunteers. Know that your work is bringing hope to the lives of the poor and poor in spirit."

CARDINAL PELL'S APPEAL TO GO TO HIGH COURT

The High Court of Australia has granted leave for Cardinal George Pell to appeal against his conviction on Seven representatives from the Catholic community in sex-abuse charges.

The controversy over the conviction of Cardinal George Pell has not gone away, despite the time that has elapsed since his conviction in December 2018, and sentencing last March.

Cardinal Pell has not been moved to an ordinary prison, as would normally be expected, but remains in solitary confinement in the Melbourne Assessment Prison. He is fighting to clear his name by appealing against his conviction to the High Court, which will hear his case early next year.

PNG VISIT AFFIRMS NEED FOR SAFE, SECURE PATHWAYS FOR REFUGEES AND PEOPLE SEEKING ASYLUM

Australia have returned from a visit to Papua New Guinea (PNG) to listen, pray and express solidarity with people seeking asylum and refugees and gain a better understanding of the human experience complexities of the situation.

The group has affirmed the need for the Medevac provision as part of a bill that will be debated in Federal Parliament over the coming days, and called on the Federal Government to accept New Zealand's, or any other safe and secure country's offer to secure the future of these individuals who are now either considered refugees, or migrants in a vulnerable situation.

Bishop Vincent Long OFM Conv, Chairman of the ACBC Commission for Social Justice – Mission and Service and Bishop of Parramatta, says that the Catholic Church in PNG has been active in supporting refugees and people seeking asylum, both on Manus Island and in Port Moresby, where the majority of individuals now reside.
