

JUST MAN DREAMING


Joseph could not ignore Mary's pregnancy, but he had an exceptional large-heartedness, so that he preserved a future for Mary even though she had apparently wronged him.

If he had gone to sleep in a frame of mind to avenge his honour, he would not have been ready to have the deepest levels of his consciousness stirred in the way God wanted. In the deep sleep of a just and good man, Joseph was enlightened as to the divine dimension of Mary's pregnancy. The old cycle of human history, literally generation after generation, was being broken. Something utterly new had happened.

You and I are just as likely to receive an intuition as to God's plan for us in the depths of sleep: who we really are, who we are destined to be, where we fit in to God's plan for transforming the whole of creation. When we get these instructive moments in our sleep, what can we do when we wake up? We can do what Joseph did: get up and do what is needed to fulfil the message.

We could pause for a moment to thank Joseph for showing what dreams can be made of. Tonight might be the night!




PLENARY COUNCIL ADVENT PRAYER

FRANCIS: ADVENT A TIME OF CONVERSION

Advent season is a time of conversion and opportunity to make space in one's heart for Christ to come and fill it with joy, Pope Francis said. Source: CNA.

"Advent, a time of grace, tells us that it is not enough to believe in God: it is necessary to purify our faith every day. It is a matter of preparing to welcome – not a fairytale character – but the God who calls us, involves us, and before whom a choice is imposed," Pope Francis said in his Angelus address. Pope Francis reminded the children of the meaning of the nativity scene by quoting a passage of his apostolic letter, Admirabile Signum,

published on the first day of Advent this year:

"The nativity scene is like a living Gospel," he said. "As man and woman. We come to realize that so great is his love for us that he became one of us, so that we in turn might become one with him." The Pope said that the child Jesus in the nativity scene has "the face of our most needy brothers and sisters."

"The poor are a privileged part of this mystery; often they are the first to recognize God's presence in our

midst," he said.

<u>POPE: PRAYERS OF THE OLD ARE POWERFUL</u>

On the eve of his 83rd birthday, Pope Francis met with a group of his peers – although many were a few years

Grandparents, who have received the blessing of seeing their children's children, are entrusted with a great task: transmitting the experience of life and the history of the family, the community, the people," the Pope said yesterday during an audience with members of the Italian National Association of Senior Workers.

Pope Francis, who was born December 17, 1936, told association members that one's later years should be a "season of dialogue," because "the future of a people naturally presupposes a dialogue and encounter between the old and young to build a society that is more just, more beautiful, has more solidarity and is more Christian".

As one grows older, he said, "the Lord renews his call to us. He calls us to preserve and hand on the faith; he calls us to pray, especially to intercede; he calls us to be

alongside those who are in need".

"The elderly, grandparents, have a unique and special ability to understand the most problematic situations,

situations, their prayer is strong, it's potent.'

By living one's senior years as a gift and a time for dialogue, he said, the elderly show the lie of "the traditional stereotype of the elderly: ill, handicapped, dependent, isolated, besieged by fear, left out, having a weak identity after losing their social role."

Active seniors, he said, also fight a system that focuses more on "costs and risks" than on "resources and

potential."

"The future – and this is not an exaggeration – will be found in dialogue between the young and the old," he said.

"Remember, talk to young people, not to clobber them, no. To listen to them, to sow something. This dialogue is the future."

<u>SIGNIFICANT PROGRESS MADE, BUT</u> <u>KEEPING KIDS SAFE REMAINS TOP PRIORITY</u>

Catholic leaders have submitted a report to the National Office for Child Safety outlining the Church's ongoing response to the recommendations of the Royal Commission

into Institutional Responses to Child Sexual Abuse.

The publication of the report from the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (ACBC) and Catholic Religious Australia (CRA) coincides with the second anniversary of the release of the Royal Commission's final report. The Church's report, which focuses on progress from November 2018 to November 2019, is itself responding to one of the Royal Commission's recommendations.

"The past year has seen steady and significant progress made across a range of areas, including in education, in governance reform and in responding to victims and we contemplate the Christmas story, we are invited to survivors of child sexual abuse," ACBC president set out on a spiritual journey, drawn by the humility of Archbishop Mark Coleridge said. "Clearly, any institution the God who became man in order to encounter every that engages with young people must always be vigilant, working to ensure that strong and effective protocols and procedures are in place, generating a culture committed to prompt and decisive action when allegations arise."

CRA president Br Peter Carroll FMS said the adoption of the National Catholic Safeguarding Standards earlier this year was an important moment in the Church's response. "The Standards that religious institutes and dioceses have endorsed build on the 10 key elements as outlined by the Royal Commission, adding an additional layer of requirements that reflect the circumstances of the Catholic

Church," he said.

"The person who files the report, the person who alleges to have been harmed and the witnesses shall not be bound by any obligation of silence with regard to matters involving the case," the Pope ordered in a new "Instruction the Confidentiality On Proceedings," published yesterday.

In an accompanying note, Bishop Juan Ignacio Arrieta, secretary of the Pontifical Council for Legislative Texts, said the change regarding the "pontifical secret" has nothing to do with the seal of the sacrament of

confession.

"The absolute obligation to observe the sacramental seal," he said, "is an obligation imposed on the priest by reason of the position he holds in administering the sacrament of confession and not even the penitent can free him of it."

"And when they pray for these The instruction was published by the Vatican along with already-updated Sacramentorum the changes to Sanctitatis Tutela (Safeguarding the Sanctity of the Sacraments), the 2001 document issued by St John Paul II outlining procedures for the investigation and trial of any member of the clergy accused of sexually abusing a child or vulnerable adult or accused of acquiring, possessing or distributing child pornography.

In describing the procedural norms for how the tribunal of the Congregation for the Doctrine of the Faith is to be composed and conducted, Pope Francis has removed the requirement that the legal representative of the accused be a priest. The law now reads: "The role of advocate or procurator is carried out by a member of the faithful possessing a doctorate in canon law, who is approved by

the presiding judge of the college."

FIRST READING: Isaiah 7: 10-14

The book of Isaiah was written at a time when the people of Israel were under threat and had once again fallen away from their covenant with God. Isaiah's messianic prophecy is a promise to the people of the time that God-is-with-us now, and God-will-be-with-us in the future when the Messiah is born of a young woman.

RESPONSORIAL PSALM:

Response: Let the Lord enter; he is King of glory.

1. The Lord's is the earth and its fullness, the world and all its peoples. It is he who set it on the seas; on the waters he made it firm. (R.)

2. Who shall climb the mountain of the Lord? Who shall stand in his holy place? The man with clean hands and pure heart, who desires not worthless things. (R.)

3. He shall receive blessings from the Lord and reward from the God who saves him. Such are the men who seek him, seek the face of the God of Jacob. (R.)

SECOND READING: Romans 1: 1-7

Paul highlights the link between the message of Jesus and the ancient traditions of Israel. However, Jesus is more than human. Through his death and resurrection he has been established Son of God in power. The resurrection uniquely manifested his divine sonship.

GOSPEL ACCLAMATION:

Alleluia!

A virgin will give birth to a son; his name will be Emmanuel: God is with us.

Alleluia! Alleluia!

GOSPEL: Matthew 1: 18-24

The birth of Jesus, son of God, son and child of Judaism. Matthew's Gospel focuses on Joseph. It is through Joseph that Jesus comes into the House of David. It is Joseph who receives an annunciation that the child has been conceived through the power of the Holy Spirit. The future lies hidden from Joseph, as the future of any child lies hidden from its parents. Joseph trusts this future into God's hands.
